ALL SAINTS SERVICES AND OPENING TIMES

Our pattern of services is as follows:

- ★ Morning Prayer takes place Monday to Wednesday at 9.15am in the church and via Zoom for anyone who would like this option.
- ★ A service of Holy Communion is held in church every Thursday morning at 9.30am.
- ★ An 8am service of Holy Communion is held in church on the first and third Sundays of the month (the third Sunday will use the Book of Common Prayer).
- **★** Our 10am Sunday services follow this pattern:
 - ♦ First Sunday: Café-style Altogether Worship
 - Second, fourth and fifth Sundays:
 Family Communion with Children's Church
 - ♦ Third Sunday: Morning Worship with Children's Church Note: Children's Church is term-time only
- ★ Each Sunday, we hold 'Tea-Time Church' at 4pm.

THOUGHTS FROM THE VICARAGE

A few days ago I was privileged to visit Coventry Cathedral with our younger daughter, Lydia. Lydia had been at a conference at Warwick University, at it seemed an ideal opportunity to spend a day together. Lydia had never been to Coventry Cathedral, so we made that our first destination.

I remember being taken to the Cathedral by my parents when I was about 10 years old, and finding it an unforgettable experience. The remains of the old Cathedral – bombed out in 1940 – stand alongside the new Cathedral; and the two are poignantly linked together. The new cathedral is daringly 'modern', with works by some of the foremost artists of the 20 th century: Graham Sutherland's Christ in Glory (the largest tapestry in the world), John Piper's abstract Baptistery window, and John Hutton's great west screen to name a few. I remember not knowing what to make of it as a child – visiting only a decade or so after the new cathedral had been completed in 1962.

Today Coventry Cathedral is a focus for reconciliation throughout the world. Every weekday at 12 noon there is a Litany of Reconciliation, based around Jesus' words, 'Father forgive'. This service is prayed throughout the world by partners from the Community of the Cross of Nails, who are active in reconciliation in a range of different ways. At a

time when our world is facing increased tension, both in the Middle East and Ukraine, Coventry Cathedral's ministry of reconciliation seems deeply

poignant. As Lydia and I attended the Litany of Reconciliation, it offered a sense of hope –

the hope of the Gospel of reconciliation, for our challenging times.

Today, in all our services at All Saints, we pray regularly for peace and reconciliation – being aware that we all have a part to play. I was reminded of that song, 'Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me' by Jackson and Miller, also written in the post-war years. In this month of May, as we continue through the Easter season, and prepare for Pentecost, let's pray for the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in our world – bringing peace and reconciliation where it's needed most.

MISSION FOCUS: CHRISTIAN AID WEEK Sunday 12th to Saturday 18th May 2024

Christian Aid exists to create a world where everyone can live a full life, free from poverty.

Set up by the Irish and British Churches in 1945 they help people of all faiths and none.

The year in numbers: 2022 to 2023:

- ★ 3.3 million people benefited from Christian Aid's interventions
- ★ 275 projects were implemented globally
- ★ £90.6 million was raised throughout the year.

The new Chair of Christian Aid (March 2024) is the Bishop of London, Sarah Mullally (pictured) who has said:

"I have long admired Christian Aid and its steadfast commitment to combating poverty and injustice and campaigning for change." "This work has never been more vital than now, as the climate crisis forces us to face questions about our stewardship of creation, and violence and conflict around the world acutely undermine God's agenda of justice and peace."



Current programmes focus on topics as diverse as: emergency response to natural disasters such as earthquakes, or man-made disasters such as war; peace building; health, land rights, tax justice and helping communities adapt to climate change. Christian Aid helps women (and families) to set up businesses – maybe selling surplus food that they have grown, or things they have made more profitably.



As their website states, Christian Aid's work in Africa includes strengthening peace-building in South Sudan, promoting resilient farming in Kenya and challenging inequality in Sierra Leone. Christian Aid also works with women to increase their access to green and sustainable energy in Burkina Faso, Ethiopia and Malawi.

In Asia, Christian Aid's programmes include promoting women's rights in Afghanistan, justice and peacebuilding in Myanmar and ensuring people can access the services they need in Bangladesh.

In Latin America and the Caribbean, Christian Aid helps promote gender justice in the Dominican Republic, El Salvador and Guatemala, peace-building in Colombia, and supports marginalised communities to adapt their livelihoods to climate change in Honduras, Nicaragua and Haiti. Christian Aid works to stop trafficking of children out of Haiti – returning over 1 thousand children a year to their families.

Christian Aid's work in the Middle East includes defending people's rights in Israel and the Occupied Palestinian territory, protecting women at risk of violence in Iraq and providing humanitarian assistance to refugees in Lebanon.



What can we at All Saints do to support this caring charity?

- 1. **Deliver envelopes** to houses in this area (no need to collect them nowadays we put information on the back of each envelope as to how people can give online, or where they can return their envelopes to). If you even have 30 minutes spare in Christian Aid week it will be great if you can deliver some envelopes.
- 2. **Cake sale and car wash** at Onslow Village Hall 2pm to 5pm on Saturday 18th May. Please come and support this bake cakes, buy cakes, wash cars and bring your car to be washed. Also please encourage your neighbours to come. Please let Carolyn Nicholls or Katherine Hopwood know what help you can offer.

GREETINGS FROM UKARUMPA PAPUA NEW GUINEA

We recently attended a celebration of all the Scripture published by our organisation here in Papua New Guinea in the last two years. There were audio recordings, various booklets, New Testaments and one whole Bible.



We thank God for the chance to be part of this Bible translation work, and for all of you who partner with us through prayer, encouragement and financial giving.

Having discussed the findings of the Community Audit, it was felt that the existing design for the new foyer did not have enough space to meet our needs. In addition we were unclear about the correct interpretation of the recent geotechnical surveys. So a meeting was held on April 10th with the architect and structural engineers.

We gave a quick presentation about the Community Audit which ended with an outline of our thoughts on a new design for the extension on the slope down to the car park. This suggested a realignment of the new toilets, a slightly larger kitchen and a much larger reception area. This area would extend out toward the existing steps down to the hall. It was also proposed that a folding door be inserted at the back of the church which could be opened to utilise the reception area as an overspill when necessary. Finally it was suggested that the existing hedge was removed and that a ramp and new steps leading to the hall might be constructed.

The architect liked the various ideas and will now draw up some new concept designs. He also said that the Community Audit would help us in gaining Diocesan and Borough council planning permission. The structural engineer said that further geotechnical work will be needed to ascertain both the length of piles used for the new foundations and any problems with tree roots.



LENT COURSE 2024 REVIEW



"TARRY AWHILE" by Selina Stone was a curious choice for this year's All Saints Lent Course. Written by an African Caribbean, born and raised in Birmingham, with a vibrant and influential Pentecostal background, she presents a rich image of a different culture which shaped her experience of faith, prayer and worship. Her ancestors' experiences of coming to the UK ('Windrush Generation') enabled her to understand and express a deep-rooted feeling of displacement and oppression, which she feels is still very prevalent in Black communities today.

Her focus is on 'Black Spirituality' and seems more 'autobiography' than 'Lent Book'. A significant part of her Pentecostal upbringing assumed that 'speaking in tongues' was essential proof of the Spirit's presence. As predominantly white and Anglican, with less vibrance, energy and emotion, and with a more staid and traditional approach to faith and 'Spirituality', it was difficult for participants to identify with such different experience. Whereas differing experiences of others from all walks of life and faith are broadening and enriching, applying them to one's own spiritual journey (in Life as well as Lent) is not necessarily helpful or relevant.

But we have much to learn; in the Pentecostal tradition, Sundays are completely devoted to 'going to Church' for most of the day; everyone 'dressed in their best' and the **Day is for The Lord**. How **wonderful** is that? In her book there is much about 'bringing everything to God' and God being present in every part of our lives. Brought up with an exuberant high-spirited form of worship, she movingly reflects on how she discovered 'silent prayer' and expresses her gratitude for a 'deeper understanding of the Christian life and capacity to find God in the darkness'.

The seven chapter titles ('Darkness', 'One', 'Movement', 'Spirit', 'Quiet', 'Healing' and 'Weeping') were inspiring, and within each chapter were several complex and often ambiguous questions for us to discuss in our zoom 'break-out' groups but inevitably there wasn't enough time to do them justice or explore them fully. And no time to contemplate the last two chapters.

One of the riches of participating in a Lent Course should perhaps be the opportunity to discover afresh the meaning and message of Lent and Easter. Studying the Scriptures, sharing thoughts and experiences about its relevance to our daily lives is vital, inspiring and encouraging, and does much to bring us together. I wonder if this book would be a greater inspiration to those whose experience resonated more readily with the author.



PARISH PROFILE: MARGUERITE AND DAVE BARCLAY

How long have you lived in Guildford and where were you previously?

Dave and Marguerite moved to Elmside in 2010 from their home in the Scottish borders, not far from Selkirk. It was a very special home. Needing a complete renovation, it was a daunting project, but the beautiful landscape gave them a huge sense of wellbeing, and Marguerite enjoyed modernising the interior and restoring the building's original features. They made the most of the space by offering bed and breakfast as a sideline.

Before their 12 years in Scotland, they lived in St John's, Woking, with their daughters Natasha and Emily. Marguerite was a social worker and Dave taught at a local primary school.

The move back down to Surrey in 2010 came when they realised that their remote location - miles from the hospital and doctor's surgery, and with no public transport - was not going to be suitable long term.

What brought you to All Saints?

Marguerite and Dave were keen to join a church as soon as they moved into Elmside, having been worshipping regularly all their lives. They joined a service at St Saviour's, but felt it was too big and a little impersonal. Soon after, on their first visit to All Saints, they were warmly welcomed by Reverend Barbara and others in the congregation, and they have never looked back.

What do you value most about All Saints?

Both Dave and Marguerite love that All Saints welcomes people from all different backgrounds and with different experiences and expectations of church – they feel it is a unique place where everyone is encouraged to use their gifts and follow their calling. It took Marguerite some time to adjust to their new life in the south and come to terms with losing the life they had lovingly created in Scotland. Dave, already a licensed lay reader, was quickly drawn into the worship team and started a home group which provided a perfect environment for several people in the congregation who were keen

to build their faith. The group was jointly run with Mary Bentall for some time, with Mary preparing and serving a meal each time the group met.

Where did you spend your childhood, and how did you meet?

Marguerite and Dave are both originally from London. Dave, an only child, grew up in Balham during the war – he recalls that his dad made him a train set, complete with bridges and tunnels, as toys weren't available to buy. Marguerite grew up with her older sister and younger brother in Hither Green. They spent their early years living with rationing – Marguerite's mother was a brilliant cook and grew a lot of the family's food in the garden.



Later, they both attended Brethren churches in Wimbledon. They met at the church youth group and began to spend time together there and on the regular Saturday rambles organised by the group.

Where do you most like to spend time in Guildford?

Marguerite loves Wisley, and they both really enjoy going out for dinner at the Italian restaurants Olivo and Positano in town.

What music do you like to play?

Dave's choice would be classical, particularly choral music. He's also keen on opera, Tosca being a favourite. Marguerite loves Elgar's symphony for the cello.

And finally, your favourite book?

Marguerite loved The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams. And Dave's choice is The Pilgrim's Progress by John Bunyan.








No Ceiling to Hope: Stories of grace from the world's most dangerous places By Patrick Regan and Liza Hoeksma, SPCK, £10.99

Here are some real-life stories from across the world to show how Christians are helping the most vulnerable in society with God's love.

In Bolivia, Christians are backing education projects to help families to find a way out of poverty. In London, XLP is mentoring young people to turn aside

from violence. In Los Angeles, a new future is being offered to gang girls. In high security prisons in the UK and US, the Spirit is turning lives around. In Belfast's Shankill Road area, a group of elderly ladies is cooking meals for men who sit all day in local pubs . . . The list is extensive, and inspiring. The common element is that, in all circumstances, Christ is offering hope.



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
