ALL SAINTS SERVICES AND OPENING TIMES

Our pattern of services is as follows:

- ★ Morning Prayer takes place Monday to Wednesday at 9.15am in the church and via Zoom for anyone who would like this option.
- ★ A service of Holy Communion is held in church every Thursday morning at 9.30am.
- ★ An 8am service of Holy Communion is held in church on the first and third Sundays of the month (the third Sunday will use the Book of Common Prayer).
- ★ Our 10am Sunday services follow this pattern:
 - ♦ First Sunday: Café-style Altogether Worship
 - Second, fourth and fifth Sundays:
 Church Family Communion with Children's Church
 - ♦ Third Sunday: Morning Worship with Children's Church Note: Children's Church is term-time only
- ★ Each Sunday, we hold 'Tea-Time Church' at 4pm.

THOUGHTS FROM THE VICARAGE



Every year as Advent begins, and we start to prepare for Christmas, I ask myself the question, 'What is at the heart of Christmas this year?' In one sense the story is the same for us each year, and the message is as old as time. But in another sense it's new every year, as we engage with the season afresh – as we come to worship.

In that poor, irrelevant stable in Bethlehem, in a moment of wonder and worship, the great dis-

covery was made: 'God is with us - Emmanuel.' Mary and Joseph discovered it as they adored their new-born baby. The shepherds glimpsed it as they knelt down in awe before the child. It was revealed to the Magi, as they bowed down in worship, offering their gifts. 'God is with us - Emmanuel.'

Two thousand years later we too can hear that message afresh, as we come to worship again this Christmas. The Lord himself is to be found when we gather together to honour him.

This year let's make coming to worship the focus of this season of Advent and Christmas. Let's bring our families and friends and neighbours with us. We need to know, in the depths of our beings, that 'God is with us' – whatever challenges and problems we face. Our needy world also needs to hear that message: God is with us; he cares; he loves us, and nothing is impossible with him.

And so may the joy of the angels, the eagerness of the shepherds, the perseverance of the wise men, the obedience of Joseph and Mary and the peace of the Christ-child be yours this Christmas, as you come to worship him.

Mosaic Middle East (MME) has been one of our core organisations which All Saints has supported both in prayer and financially for a number of years. This support is set to continue in 2026. Its involvement in one of the hospitals in Gaza was reported in the June magazine, but, in recent weeks, we have been alerted to the worsening situation in Iraq itself, with regional conflict and community differences heightening tension and creating an atmosphere of fear of further conflict and loss of life and deprivation.

Iraq is home to one of the world's oldest Christian communities, yet numbers have plummeted from over 1.5 million in the 1990s to around 150,000 today. The pressures of war, persecution and economic hardship have forced many to leave the country. Those who remain face daily discrimination and genuine threats to their safety. As the Anglican Rector of Baghdad, the Revd Canon Faiz Jirjeez, MBE, has pointed out, "Christians are treated as the bottom of the bottom. They have no jobs, no security, no future for their children and many cannot afford to leave the country." The children have no access to education and women and girls often hide their faith in public for fear of attack. Even small freedoms are eroded by restrictive laws and social hostility. So Christians feel a crushing weight in these times of growing tension.

But... despite all this... MME has witnessed how, against all the odds, the church continues to care for the most vulnerable, offering food, medical support, education and, above all, the assurance that they are not forgotten. This is only possible through the support given by MME's friends in the UK and other supportive countries, organisations and individuals. The Missions Group here at All Saints regularly receives heartfelt thanks for the financial donations and prayers which we regularly and continuously give.

And encouragement for us all may be given in return by the words of

Canon Faiz. "The harvest is so great. Some Muslims now attend services, and many bring prayer requests. Muslim clergy exchange greetings with me at Christmas and Easter. Barriers of fear are breaking down."

Canon Faiz has mentioned two ways that we can help as individuals: PRAY: Please pray for peace in Iraq, for God's protection over St. George's Church in Baghdad, and for strength for the Revd Faiz and his team as they carry on their ministries in such challenging circumstances.

GIVE: Please consider making a gift yourself in order to provide food parcels and essential support for families in desperate need. Details may easily be found on the MME website: www.mosaicmiddleeast.com.

FINANCE VISION GROUP UPDATE

🔰 It's a busy time for the Finance Vision Group.

We've just completed a reforecast for year end 2025, looked at how to invest the funds from the sale of Thorn Bank, written a Financial Policy document and proposed a two option budget for 2026.

So how about finances at All Saints? Well, we think we will just about break even this year.

It costs us £451 a day to run All Saints' Church - that's £164,615 a year. This enables us to maintain the church, run youth and toddler groups, hold services during the week and at 8am, 10am and 4pm on Sundays. We have a wide outreach to local schools, Dray Court and home visits to members of our congregation. We have many Small Groups that represent our community such as men's and women's Bible study groups, a lunch group and the Hear Here Clinic. We host an autumn fair attended by a large number of people from the community and a Bonfire & Fireworks event for 500 people. It's beautiful to see Missio Dei, God's mission, working here in our community. A large proportion of our income goes to supporting our mission. We also financially support the work of the diocese, clergy renumeration and those churches not able to support themselves. Truly Christian, if you read 2 Corinthians 8-9!

We balance this expense with income from generous donations from the congregation, hiring out the church hall and the church itself. We also benefit from Gift Aid from our donations. There is no income from the diocese or external funding sources. It is all self generating.

Whilst I think we will see our expenses match our income this year, it may not be the case next year. Whichever way I cut it, we are likely to be in the red by several £1000s. We have fixed expenses that must be met and inflation is now catching up with us. A further challenge was the loss of a regular booking of the church which had generated a significant amount of income.


So, I am turning to you all. This is hard to do because I know you have given so generously for the Big Build. This has raised in the region of £275,000 - a wonderful total. Nevertheless, it would be a travesty if we completed the new building and then struggled to cover our day to day running costs as a church.

I am asking you to increase the amount you regularly give by 10% to help us balance 2026. If you don't already give regularly to All Saints, I would strongly encourage you to do so; the health of our finances depends on each one of us giving as generously as we can. Given these challenging circumstances, you may like to give a one off donation as well. It will enable us as a church to live out God's kingdom here in this parish.

There's no secret to any of our finances so please ask me if you'd like to know more. Thank you so much for your continued generosity and support of our wonderful church and community here in this parish.

CONSIDERING BAPTISM?

If you live in our parish, we would love to welcome your family into our church family by baptising your child. We believe that God welcomes all people, and baptism is the first step on the journey of faith. Through baptism each of us begins a journey as a follower of Jesus. Adults may also wish to be baptised, sometimes alongside their children, which makes for a very special celebration.

At All Saints, baptisms take place on Sundays, during the 10 a.m. services.

Your first step is to come to one of our 10 a.m. services, to meet the congregation and our vicar, Revd Beverly Watson, and to get a feel for all that goes on at All Saints. Baptisms can take place at any of our services:

- •'Café-style Altogether Worship' on the first Sunday of each month
- Family Communion on the second, fourth and fifth Sundays
- •Morning Worship on the third Sunday.

It's advisable to come to each of these services, to decide which would be most suitable for the baptism of your child.

The next step is to contact our vicar, Beverly, to make an appointment to meet and discuss baptism - its meaning and significance. At this meeting you can explore possible dates for the baptism.

When a date is confirmed, you will need to provide details of the candidate, parents and Godparents. You will be given a paper form or you can complete this online: allsaints.short.gy/baptism

We also offer Thanksgiving Services, for those who would prefer this. At this service we simply give thanks for the life of your child, and ask for God's blessing on his or her life. On the day, we look forward to welcoming you and your family and friends, and celebrating with you.

ANDY WELLS: MY JOURNEY SO FAR

Four years ago last month, I knew this was not enough.

I had just finished an occasional preachers course at St John's. I felt there was more I had to do. I had just decided to cut my hours at work and retire early. More time in the garden, extended holidays and a rest from 40 years in the insurance industry.

God graciously rescued me from this life of sin and I find myself writing this article in college at a retreat in Henley seven months away, with God's grace, from ordination as a curate at All Saints.

How did I get here?!

Well, back to the occasional preachers course. I felt there was more I had to do, as I mentioned. I had a chance two minute conversation with the course leader and found out there was such a thing as a self-supporting ordained minister. Perfect. Clearly not a chance conversation but God's plan.

I spoke to Beverly who kindly agreed to support me and I spent just over a year in discernment. This is a structured period of working out what God has called you to do. After passing a midway series of interviews, I was sent for a formal two-day assessment called a BAP (or Bishops' Advisory Panel) where delegates are assessed over two days and a report is sent to the bishop. This is accompanied by a further conversation with a separate bishop and the decision of whether to recommend for ordination training is taken.

I started training in 2023 and have just started my final year. I finish at the beginning of June and with God's grace, will be ordained on 28th June 2026 at Guildford Cathedral.


Training takes up 15 to 20 hours per week studying, plus three weekend residential courses a year and three study Saturdays. The training is formalised under the framework of Durham University with assignments set to degree level. After three years you attain a Higher Certificate of Education in Theology and can carry on to complete their theology de-

gree over the next two years, which I hope to do.

The course is, as you can imagine, hugely formational in how you develop your relationship with God and transform into being one of Christ's disciples. I look out across the congregation, now, and see everyone there as a person I look after and care for, even if I've known them for 20 years! The course teaches Bible studies, evangelism and mission, pastoral care, spirituality, preaching, Christian doctrine, multi-faith, reflective practice, worship and mental health. I cannot believe how much I've learnt. Last year students spent 50 hours working in chaplaincy roles. I chose to work at Surrey University and one year later am part of the chaplaincy team staff - something I am really proud of. It's a real actionable discipleship in the community. I never would have thought I'd be doing that a couple of years ago. It just goes to show you how God has a plan for everyone's life!

The third year of training is quite an intense one. This year, we are learning in depth analysis and understanding of the Old and New Testament and church doctrine. Next January to March I will be working at another local church before returning to All Saints at Easter. I'll also be bringing together my sermon portfolio and writing reflectively upon my time at another church and how it differs and compares to All Saints. Then in January, I'll be doing something that makes this very real - ordering my clergy shirts and robes.

Well, this afternoon at college, we're discussing Christology (the person that is Christ), the Trinity (Father, Son and Holy Spirit as one yet distinctive) and theological anthropology (humanity in the light of Christ). Phew!

BIG BUILD UPDATE



It has been another month of waiting for a decision to be made by GBC on our planning application. We are hoping that a favourable verdict will emerge in early December. We are not able to make bids for grants until we receive GBC's findings nor are architects happy to start making any detailed construction drawings.

We have been busy deciding which of three architects will be engaged to help us through the next design stages of our project. We met with Symbiosis who would operate with Bijou Harding as their consultant. After a face to face on-site meeting with them, the steering group decided that we should proceed with Symbiosis and this will be confirmed at the next meeting of the PCC. Symbiosis stressed to us that before we put out a tender for the work we must make sure we have decided on all the materials, colours and form of heating we would like to be used.

On the funding side, the sale of 6 Thorn Bank is proceeding with a completion possibly before Christmas. As 2025 ends we would like to thank everyone who has kindly donated to the Big Build. We hope that it will not be too long before you see some work starting.

THE MAGAZINE TEAM REVIEWS FAIRTRADE...

Lichfields Fairtrade Original Coffee



This is the coffee that we buy to serve after our 10am Sunday services. We commit to buy Fairtrade for all our tea and coffee supplies. Buying these 1kg bags also helps us to reduce the amount of waste. As for the coffee...we think it tastes pretty good! As we're making it in a filter machine, the strength can be adjusted to taste – in fact, you may notice a difference Sunday by Sunday as different members of the team take their turn in brewing! It has a strength of 3, meaning that it's a medium roast, so hopefully will appeal to all of our coffee drinkers. We think it's a smooth coffee and mellow, with no bitterness. This coffee is sourced from smallholder farmers in central and South America and Vietnam.

We buy this coffee from Bookers (at £14.49/kg) as the church has an account there, but it can also be found online. Come and try it after church – and if you'd like to help brew it, we'd love to have you as part of the team - just speak to Eve Gunn.

Sainsbury's Fairtrade Decaff House Blend



This is our decaff alternative on a Sunday morning. We always brew a jug of decaf to have alongside the caffeinated. Again, this has a strength of 3, to suit everyone. The beans are arabica and grown at high altitude, producing a soft, balanced flavour. We think it has a good depth of flavour and is strong enough to provide a pick-you-up even without the caffeine!

The price is good too (always important for us) at £3.50/bag (£1.54/100g)

Cafedirect Macchu Picchu



This is the coffee to be found in Eve and Trish's coffee pot. They both enjoy a strong coffee and so a number 4 (or even 5) is what's needed! The Machu Picchu has a full flavour with no harsh undertones it's nice and smooth.

Café Direct has a few different blends, and is definitely worth a try. The Machu Picchu is around £5.95/bag (£2.98/100g)

Coop Italian Style



This is pretty good value at £3.45 a bag (£1.73/100g), and if you live at the eastern end of the parish, it can be bought at the Madrid Road Coop.

It's medium strong with a lovely chocolatey aroma. Not sure what the 'Italian Style' branding really means - possibly best served with biscotti!

Coop has been a supporter of Fairtrade since 1994, with 100% Fairtrade commitments for its ownbrand coffee, tea, bagged sugar and bananas amongst other products.

Fairtrade ensures decent working conditions, fair prices and sustainable working practices for workers and farmers in developing countries. So, you may expect to pay a little more, but we hope you agree that it's a very worthwhile movement.

A DIFFFRENT APPROACH TO CHRISTMAS

Our Eco-Tip this month is also a book review.

The book is called 'Dreaming of a Green Christmas' and is written by Olivia Warburton.

Wouldn't it be great if we could make Christmas greener, less wasteful, less stressful, more enjoyable, and with more space to focus on what it's really all about? Written for families to work through, Olivia Warburton's Dreaming of a Green Christmas is an essential companion as you prepare for the festive season.

With 111 practical eco-tips to select from, you'll find inspiration and encouragement, with pauses in the busyness for moments of biblical reflection that speak of God's love for his creation – people and planet. Olivia leads her local church's eco-group and believes that everyone can make a difference to help our world flourish, however tiny our efforts may seem.

'I wanted to give families a tool kit for approaching Christmas differently', she says, 'and to show that Christmas doesn't have to be expensive and wasteful, as well as hopefully removing some of the stress. My aim was to enable people to make choices they are happier with and give the context for why it's a biblical principle to try to look after the world God has given us'.

Here's a taster of what the book has to offer:

Advent calendars

Create a 'reverse Advent calendar': each day through Advent, put a food item aside in a box and then donate it all to a local food bank. You may want to finish this earlier than Christmas Day, as donating before Christmas will be appreciated by those who can't afford treats or even essentials.)



Decorations

Make your own decorations from recyclable materials, such as dried orange slice ornaments, sticks of cinnamon, loo roll fairies or giant paper snowflakes. Turn scrap paper into paper chains. Foraged materials like pine cones and holly can be used for wreaths, which can then be recycled via the garden waste bin.




Women of the Nativity – an Advent and Christmas Journey in Nine Stories By Paula Gooder, CHP, £9.89





somewhere quiet where he can be grumpy in peace. But can he find such a place, or will he return to his barn in time for a big, not-at-all grumpy, surprise?





