ALL SAINTS SERVICES AND OPENING TIMES

Our pattern of services is as follows:

- ★ A service of Holy Communion is held in church every Thursday morning at 9.30am.
- ★ An 8am service of Holy Communion is held in church on the first and third Sundays of the month (the third Sunday will use the Book of Common Prayer).
- ★ Our 10am Sunday services follow this pattern:
 - ◇ First Sunday: Café-style Altogether Worship
 - ◇ Second, fourth and fifth Sundays:
Church Family Communion with Children's Church
 - ◇ Third Sunday: Morning Worship with Children's Church

The work of Guildford Street Angels

In 2026, All Saints will be supporting the ‘Guildford Town Centre Chaplaincy’. GTCC is a charity which is run by representatives of various churches in Guildford, for the people of Guildford.

Over 100 volunteers take part in the three activities of the Chaplaincy:

- Street Angels
- Community Angels
- Volunteer Chaplains

In this article we will focus on the work of the Street Angels, perhaps the most visible to members of the public.

Street Angels is a team providing practical care every Friday and Saturday night to folks who are in Guildford town centre. Anyone who finds themselves in a vulnerable state can be helped – for example this could be a result of use of alcohol, drugs, or homelessness. The Street Angels have become a well known presence, helping people to get home safely with no strings attached.

The work was founded in 2008, as a response to the high level of antiso-

cial behaviour in the town late at night. Almost overnight, tensions were calmed, crime dropped, and antisocial behaviour was reduced by around a third. Now, 50 volunteers help thousands of people per year, in work that is widely recognised and supported by civic leaders and appreciated by the police.

I recently attended a talk given by one of the chaplains, which featured many inspirational stories. The team's friendly presence establishes communication and trust on the street, and enables them to spot where their interventions can make an enormous difference to people whose night out in Guildford could otherwise have ended in danger or distress.

To quote the Police Commissioner from their most recent newsletter, "Most people will know [the Angels] for the lollipops, as well as the flip-flops they give to those who have given up on uncomfortable shoes, but all who encounter the team will remember their kindness and care."




and across the Anglican Communion to share their faith with others.

£22.99



By David F. Ford, SPCK, £10.99



£5.99



By Maggi Dawn, BRF Lent Book, £9.99



It was designed to be a reminder of our daily dependence on God for all our needs, to draw us closer to God in prayer, to reconnect us with the idea of community, and to help us follow Christ's journey through the wilderness and on to Jerusalem. In this series of daily studies, Maggi Dawn shows how, throughout Scripture, people were radically changed by encountering the true God.



Wardrobes and Rings - Through Lenten Lands with the Inklings

This book could help enrich your Lenten journey with the insight and imagination of the Oxford Inklings - a group of writers who reshaped Christian thought and storytelling in the 20th century, and who included C S Lewis and JRR Tolkien. *Wardrobes and Rings* draws on their writings - their fiction, poetry, and essays - and offers daily readings and reflections that illuminate the path to the Cross and Resurrection. Weekly themes such as temptation, time, nature and creativity guide the way.



Dappled Beauty - Through Lent with Gerard Manley Hopkins

Gerard Manley Hopkins is one of English literature's most celebrated religious poets and a powerful companion through the Lenten season. This book takes readers on a journey of reflection and renewal, guided by Hopkins' vivid imagery, inventive language and deep theological insight. Whether you are new to Hopkins or a long-time admirer, *Dappled Beauty* opens a poetic and prayerful path through the season, from Ash Wednesday to Easter Day.



In Quietness & Trust – Lent Devotions from the Beatitudes

By Matt Searles, 10Publishing, £6.99

Early in his ministry, Jesus gave His followers a description of how He wants His people to live. Rather than seeking to ascend to God, Christian discipleship is a downward flourishing; a counter-cultural way of blessing. And so these 40 devotions will guide you through the beatitudes Jesus gave in the Sermon on the Mount. Join Jesus on His path to the cross, and see that His way – though so different from the way of the world – leads to freedom, joy, and life. This book has eight groups of five devotions, with each group focusing on the theme of one of the beatitudes from Matthew's gospel. Each day there is a verse or passage from Scripture with an accompanying devotion, a prayer and a song.



The Man on the Middle Cross - Are You Going to Heaven?

Alistair Begg, 10Publishing, £3.99

This book focuses on three people who had their lives changed when they met Jesus. Each was given hope, restoration and a way back to God: the woman at the well, the paralysed man, and the thief on the cross. With characteristic clarity, Alistair Begg explains how this offer is open to all who come to Jesus, the man on the middle cross.

SOME SMALL CHURCHES FURTHER AFIELD

My article in the January magazine was about some attractive small churches not too distant from Guildford. Now the Magazine Team has asked me to write another article by way of a follow-up. I had always planned to pen a further article later in the year, describing small but wonderful churches which I have visited during my life in more distant parts, but I have been asked to help fill the February magazine, and so I will try to do just that.

I have selected one church which I visited only last year in the Yorkshire Dales, one in the northern Lake District and one in a remote corner of Wales. All have their attractive features and all have been memorable for me in their way.

Let me introduce readers to delightful Coverdale, one of several smaller dales which feed into Wensleydale in North Yorkshire and through which one can drive to neighbouring Wharfedale. But I would recommend that you park the car in the small village of Horsehouse half way up the dale, because there you will find the humble parish church of St. Botolph (see picture 1). It lies snugly at the foot

of a tumbling stream which once powered a small mill wheel in the garden of a self-catering house where I stayed last October (see picture 2).

Down Coverdale and into Wensleydale, you will find the splendid ruins of the Cistercian Jervaulx Abbey, situated near the River Ure, which gives its name to the great county of Yorkshire.

This is a place to visit, even if it is on a smaller scale than not too distant Fountains Abbey. Also, a sign on the road before a narrow bridge over

the river informs road users that they are approaching the River Cover. The pun on the word Bridge was not lost on me!

But not far away from Jervaulx, going back to Coverdale, are the ruins of another (Premonstratensian) monastery called Coverham Abbey. Like Jervaulx, this monastery was dismantled in the reign of Henry VIII, but not before the canons of Coverham had founded a chapel at Horsehouse. This building continued to be used after the dissolution as a Chapel of Ease, but, in the nineteenth century, the church was established in its present form, probably using material from the existing chapel.

It was a quiet autumn morning when I made my way round the corner of the lane in Horsehouse and approached the church up the path, as in the first photo. Fortunately, the church was open and I was able to experience the quietness of the interior and take time to linger and absorb the holiness and peace of a building for God's people of the area. Picture 3 shows the interior.

My second choice is St. Patrick's Church in Patterdale. Patterdale, as is well known, is a popular centre for tourists situated close to the southern end of Ullswater (not far from the site by the lake where William Wordsworth noticed the wild daffodils and wrote one of his most famous

poems), and is one of the starting points for walkers wanting to ascend Helvellyn. I first became acquainted with Patterdale over 60 years ago, when I was invited to stay at the Rectory by my close friend, Andrew, during the spring university holidays. I worshipped at the historic church and helped to ring the newly installed chiming bells.

Daffodils are also to be found in a profusion of colour in the spring (see picture 4), and if you are not able to visit the church soon, please visit the church website where you will find plenty of evidence of a really happy

worshipping community.

Like St. Botolph's, the church was completely rebuilt in the nineteenth century. The earlier building is recalled in a sketch made by the famous artist J.M.W. Turner, and there has been a church on the site since at least the fourteenth century and, in the church, is a list of all the rectors since 1547.

For the last 60 years, Patterdale has been a place that I always feel that I want to re-visit. The climb up Helvellyn over the slightly frightening Striding Edge may be followed by a circular walk along to the head of Grisedale via Dollywagon Pike, or one can take a shorter route home via Catstye Cam and Swirrel Edge. I walked the former with Andrew and his father all those years ago, and, a few years later, on Andrew's 21st birthday, one party of guests camped overnight on the summit of Helvellyn, and the rest of us were guided by Andrew's father in darkness over Striding Edge, in order to meet up with the first party at dawn and greet the sunrise. Although clouds obscured the sunrise itself, we were treated to a moment of pure magic as a rainbow appeared over Red Tarn as we descended via Swirrel Edge. Andrew's father was a member of the local Mountain Rescue Team, so that helped our morale!

Lastly, please meet St. Melangell (pronounced Melangeth), who founded the church dedicated to her in the hamlet of Pennant Melangell in the Tanat Valley in mid Wales south east of Bala. Melangell was the daughter of an Irish prince in the seventh century of the Christian era, who did not fancy the life mapped out for her by her father. So, as a teenager, she sailed across the Irish Sea to Anglesey and made her way to the centre of Christianity at the time in St. Asaph further to the east. After a time, she decided to cross the hills and ended up in the beautiful Tanat Valley where she founded a church on the present site.



This site was almost certainly already used for religious worship of some sort, as the yew trees which still stand around the churchyard are about 2,000 years old. She was credited with miraculous powers, and the cur-

rent church contains a shrine to her. She is also the patron saint of hares, based on a legend that, while the local chieftain was pursuing a hare with his greyhounds, the hare ran to St. Melangell and hid by sitting on her feet underneath her full length religious gown. She gave the hare sanctuary, and it is believed that, despite what she did, she still remained popular with the said chieftain and the local community. Again, do please visit the website for further really interesting reading about this church and shrine.


STEWARDSHIP SUNDAY - 22ND FEBRUARY

REVISION OF ELECTORAL ROLL 2026

In accordance with the Church Representation Rules, the Church Electoral Roll has to be revised annually and this will be done in February, prior to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) in March.

The planned timetable is that the formal 14 day notice of the revision will be posted in the church lobby on Sunday 8th February. The revision period will begin on Sunday 22nd February and end on Saturday 7th March. On Sunday 8th March the revised Roll will be posted and no changes can then be made until the conclusion of the APCM on Sunday 22nd March.

Whilst the main purpose of the revision is to remove any names of people no longer eligible, it is a good opportunity for new people to enrol. Enrolment can be done in a number of ways. On our website (allsaintschurchgfd.org.uk/about-us/electoral-roll), an easy to use on line form can be completed. Alternatively, there is a version which can be downloaded and, after completion, either scanned and emailed to allsaintschurchgfd@gmail.com or posted to: Electoral Roll Officer, All Saints' Church, Vicarage Gate, Onslow Village, Guildford, GU2 7QJ. There will also be paper forms available in church.

By enrolling, you will become a voting member of the Church of England and be entitled to vote at the APCM on matters such as electing the Parochial Church Council and our representatives on the Deanery Synod, and also be eligible for election to church appointments.

To qualify for inclusion on the Roll, you must be baptised and aged 16 or over and a member of the Church of England. You should also either be resident in the parish or, if not resident, then have habitually attended public worship in the parish during the six months prior to enrolment. It is also possible for members of other churches to enrol under certain conditions.





Hello everyone from St Martin's!

Well, I've started my placement at St Martin's Church in East Horsley.

THE BIG PLASTIC COUNT

Count your plastic for one week from **9th to 15th March**.



Thousands of people from households, schools and communities across the country will take part in the UK's biggest people-powered investigation into household plastic waste.

By taking part in The Big Plastic Count, you'll help gather important evidence to show the true scale of the crisis – and to tell the government we need them to produce less plastic. Since our last campaign, the UK has elected a new government – one that says it's serious about tackling plastic waste. This is our chance to put their promise to the test.

How it works

1. *Sign up:* Sign up online and you will be emailed everything you need to get counting. Sign up at thebigplasticcount.com.
2. *Get ready:* Print out your counting sheet and put it somewhere prominent in your kitchen. Maybe on the fridge?
3. *Start counting:* From 9th to 15th March, count every piece of plastic packaging you throw away – in the bin, the recycling, and out and about.
4. *Submit your results:* At the end of the week, submit your results online.

What happens next?

All the data will be combined with the data of everyone who takes part in The Big Plastic Count. The numbers will be crunched to figure out how much plastic the UK is throwing away and where it ends up. The findings will be taken directly to the government. That means the more people who count, the better the data, and the greater the evidence to push for change!

When taking part, you might feel like the plastics crisis is your fault. It's not. Only governments, brands and supermarkets can create alternatives that work for everyone. Your count will push them to do that.

A RECIPE FOR LENT

Spicy butternut squash soup (serves 4)

Ingredients:

- 1 large butternut squash
- 2 medium onions
- 2 tbsp oil
- Water
- tsp of chilli powder if desired
- salt and pepper to taste.

Method

- Chop up the butternut squash without peeling it.
- Dice the onions. Fry the onions in the oil until soft: five minutes.
- Add the chilli powder and mix well with the onion and oil: two minutes.
- Add the chopped butternut squash. Mix well.
- Add sufficient water to cover the vegetables.
- Bring to the boil and then simmer until the butternut squash is soft.
- Allow to cool then either mash or blend with a blender until smooth.
- Serve with crusty bread, oatcakes or crispbread.

INTRODUCING DAME SARAH MULLALLY THE 106TH ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY

The Rt Revd and Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally DBE officially became Archbishop of Canterbury on 28th January 2026.

Most people know that she had been Bishop of London for several years, and that she is the first woman to ever become Archbishop of Canterbury. But what else do you know about her?

- ★ She was born in Woking in 1962, and is one of four children, with two sisters and one brother.
- ★ She attended Winston Churchill Comprehensive School and Woking Sixth Form College. She went on to South Bank Polytechnic and Heythrop College, University of London.
- ★ She worked as a nurse in the NHS, which she has described as "an opportunity to reflect the love of God". She specialised as a cancer nurse and became a ward sister at Westminster Hospital, before being made Director of Nursing at Chelsea and Westminster Hospital.
- ★ At the age of 37, she was appointed the Government's Chief Nursing Officer for England in the Department of Health. She was the youngest person ever to be appointed to the post. Bishop Sarah was made a Dame Commander of the British Empire in 2005 in recognition of her outstanding contribution to nursing.
- ★ She had become a Christian at the age of 16. While working as the Chief Nursing Officer for England, she discerned a call to ordination and entered training ministry at the South East Institute for Theological Education.
- ★ She was ordained in 2001 and served her curacy in St Saviour's Battersea Fields, initially as a self-supporting minister, before leaving her government post in 2004, which she has described at the time as "the biggest decision I have ever made".
- ★ In 2012 she was installed as Canon Treasurer at Salisbury Cathedral

and three years later took the role as Suffragan Bishop of Crediton in the Diocese of Exeter.

- ★ On 12th May 2018, Bishop Sarah was installed as the 133rd Bishop of London at St Paul's Cathedral, the first woman to hold the role.
- ★ Bishop Sarah sits in the House of Lords as one of the Lords Spiritual, having been introduced on 24th May 2018.
- ★ She was sworn in as a member of the Privy Council in March 2018 and became Dean of Her Majesty's Chapels Royal in July 2019.
- ★ As Bishop of London, she led the Church of England's Living in Love and Faith process from 2020 to 2023. This included the formative stages of discernment and decision making which saw the introduction of the Prayers of Love and Faith for same-sex couples.
- ★ She has served on the Church's National Safeguarding Steering Group and is also Lead Bishop for Health and Social Care issues.
- ★ As a Lord Spiritual, she has drawn from both her pastoral experience and her background in nursing and healthcare and has played a key role in the ongoing debates on assisted dying.
- ★ Archbishop Sarah is married to Eamonn, an Irish-born IT and Enterprise Architect who enjoys beekeeping and volunteering as a London tourist guide. The couple have two grown-up children, Liam and Grace.
- ★ Archbishop Sarah has continued her interest in the health service having been a non-executive director at the Royal Marsden NHS Foundation Trust then at Salisbury NHS Foundation Hospital.
- ★ She is Chair of Christian Aid.
- ★ She has spoken openly about her dyslexia, describing her difficulties with writing and reading.
- ★ In her spare time, she loves cooking, walking and pottery.

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

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14TH FEBRUARY - THE TWO VALENTINES

If you dig into the history of Valentine's Day, you discover it has a complicated past. There seems to have been two Valentines: Valentine of Terni and Valentine of Rome. But there was only one road involved: the Via Flaminia, or Flaminian Way.



According to some sources, Valentine of Terni was a third century bishop found "guilty" of having encouraged some young men to convert to Christianity. When the prefect of Rome heard of this, he was furious, and had Valentine of Terni arrested.

Valentine of Terni was then taken to Rome on the Flaminian Way, which was the road linking Rome and Terni. In Rome, Valentine of Terni was beheaded in 273. His remains were then taken back to Terni for burial. An 8th century basilica named after him is found on the Flaminian Way.

Valentine of Rome was a priest who was also martyred in the middle of the third century, this time under the authority of Claudius II. But Valentine of Rome's death may have occurred on the Flaminian Way, where another basilica, bearing his name, has also been found. This one was completed by Pope Theodosius about three centuries later.

The two stories have understandably become confused. Two Valentines, both martyred, in a time of persecution of Christians, and one Flaminian Way. Even Common Worship's choice of c.269 as the date of death is at best a guess.

One thing seems sure: our present-day custom of sending cards and flowers to declare our love has nothing to do with either Valentine. Instead, these may come from the poet John Donne in about 1632. He wrote a marriage song which includes religious commemoration of Valentine along with fertility symbolism. Even the pagan Lupercalia festival may have gone into the mix which flavours our current celebrations of the day.
