THOUGHTS FROM THE VICARAGE



Dearest Family of All Saints,

Some of you will know that Andrew, my husband – also Bishop Andrew – has been unwell for the past few months. He started undergoing medical tests last autumn, and was diagnosed with tumours on his pancreas and liver in January this year. After further tests the tumours proved to be cancerous, and with no medical cure possible. The Royal Surrey Hospital, as so often, has provided excellent care; and Andrew is now being offered chemotherapy to reduce his pain, and hopefully to improve his quality of life in the months he has left to live.

Obviously this has been a huge shock to our family, and those with whom we've shared the news; and I'm deeply grateful for the love, prayers and support that have been demonstrated to us over the past month in particular.

Andrew will be letting clergy in the wider family know this news today; and I felt I would like to let you – the family of All Saints – know at the same time.

Going forwards: I plan to remain in my post as Vicar of All Saints – a role that I treasure, and the place where I feel most at home. Later this year I'll move out of Willow Grange, and into the All Saints Vicarage, making that our 'family home' for the coming years. I hope to continue working as normal over the next few months, but acknowledge that there may be times that I need to step back a little in order to care for Andrew and the family. But I have great confidence in the strength of our church family, and trust that the Lord will lead and guide us through this time, bringing us closer together and growing deeper in faith as we walk with him.

So please be assured of my prayers for you as you receive this news. And please do continue to pray for me and my family in all that lies ahead.

**MISSION FOCUS:
A ROCHA INTERNATIONAL
& A ROCHA UK**



As well as holding many causes and organisations close to our heart, All Saints has made a commitment to support a focused group of organisations, both local and international, as part of the way we live out and show Jesus' love in a practical and biblical way. This is primarily via a small financial contribution, overseen by the 'Mission Vision Group'. Each charity or group is carefully and prayerfully selected, and supported for a designated period, and we focus on one each month for prayer and awareness.

A Rocha UK is a Christian charity (part of A Rocha International, a global family of conservation organisations) working to protect and restore the natural world and committed to equipping Christians and churches in the UK to care for the environment – for God, nature and all people. They aim to **INSPIRE** individuals and families, **EQUIP** churches and church leaders, and **BUILD** partnerships and manage land for nature and people. Some of the ways they do this is through their 'Eco Church' programme, of which All Saints is thrilled to be a **GOLD** award winner, following amazing efforts by you as members of the church and community! They also work with environmental leaders through inter-denominational (i.e. across all types of churches) work, have a 'Wild Christian' programme for individuals and families, and 'Partners in Action' network for Christian land managers who want to see land managed for the benefit of people and nature.

In the face of accelerating climate change and species loss, A Rocha recognise the need 'more than ever to take action to protect and care for nature today', and as such have a commitment to 'Creation Care' (which you can read more about [here](#) as well as a ten year aim framework, which provides an exciting vision for caring for our planet in a way that honours God and his creation:

Framework to 2030:

1. Land for nature: We want to see a large amount of land owned by UK Churches, Christian Organisations and Christian individuals being managed for nature - protecting and if possible restoring soil, water, habitats and wildlife species, and making a contribution to addressing climate change.

2. Churches and Christians for nature: We want to see the majority of the UK's local churches engaged in deliberate and on-going action to protect nature and address climate change practically and by using their voice; we want to see individual Christians routinely caring for the environment through their actions at home, in the community and by using their voice.

3. Nature for all: We want to see large numbers of the general public actively benefiting from access to nature on land owned or managed by Christians, UK churches and Christian organisations.

Here at All Saints, the work of A Rocha has been instrumental, and inspirational to us as a community, and provided a blueprint for how we as Christians can approach both caring for nature, and caring about climate change - two significant issues it can sometimes be hard to navigate from a soul-filled perspective, but areas really aligned with a heart of God that gave us water and air and trees. To find out more, I encourage you to look at the A Rocha website for a wealth of further information, events and resources, but for now I'd like to finish with a prayer selected by A Rocha as 'A Prayer for Our Time and for the Earth':

Dear God, Creator of the earth, this sacred home we share;

Give us new eyes to see the beauty all around and to protect the wonders of creation.

Give us new arms to embrace the strangers among us and to know them as family.

Give us new ears to hear and understand those who live off the land and sea, and to hear and understand those who extract its resources.

Give us new hearts to recognise the brokenness in our communities and to heal the wounds we have inflicted.

Give us new hands to serve the earth and its people and to shape beloved community.

For you are the One who seeks the lost, binds our wounds and sets us free, and it is in the name of Jesus the Christ we pray.

Amen.

BIG BUILD UPDATE



The sale of 6 Thorn Bank is proceeding following our acceptance of a revised offer of £557k. The required legal work is now in progress and we expect that it will be completed by Easter.

We are starting to apply for grants for our project and are seeking help with the task of bid writing. Over the next three months we aim to apply to about a dozen different funding bodies. Could you help us?

We are aiming to have an open meeting on Thursday 30th April. We want to show how the input from parishioners and all the parties who took part in the Community Audit has been translated into our vision. Further details of the timing will be announced next month.

STEWARDSHIP AND THE PARISH GIVING SCHEME



This year, All Saints is facing significant financial challenges. Our running costs have gone up (budgeted expenditure for 2026 is £163,000), including our Parish Share (£95,000), which covers the cost of a full time Vicar and Vicarage in this parish. Our rental income has gone down, largely due to the relocation of the Montessori Nursery (loss of £30,000). And our regular donations have decreased, as some of our members have relocated to different parts of the country. That means we are no longer able to cover our costs as a church, let alone invest in the future of All Saints – its people and its ministry in this parish and beyond.

It will take time to turn our finances around, but we need to increase total giving by a third this year, if we are to work our way back to viability, and invest in the future. To achieve this goal, we're asking all members and friends of the All Saints' church family to support us.

We also need to be sure of how much is coming in each month, and so we're asking people to donate to us via the Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) at whatever level they can afford. PGS enables you to give to All Saints on a monthly, quarterly or annual basis by Direct Debit. It's easy to setup on our dedicated portal:

www.parishgiving.org.uk/donors/find-your-parish/guildford-all-saints-church-guildford

PGS claims Gift Aid on our behalf and so making life easier for our Bookkeeper, Eve.

We appreciate that starting to give, or substantially increasing giving, may feel like a big step of faith but our confidence in giving grows as we experience God's faithfulness. The Bible promises that those who give cheerfully and sacrificially will be 'enriched in every way so that (we) can be generous on every occasion' (2 Corinthians 9:11). It has also been the experience of Christian communities down the ages that 'we cannot outgive God'.

Beverly's introductory words at David's funeral service:

Good morning. A very warm welcome to All Saints as we give thanks and celebrate the life of David Garrick. It's lovely to see family and friends and neighbours here together to support Jo and to give thanks for David's life. There are also people coming in on livestream. So a very warm welcome to those who are coming into our service via Zoom; it's good to have you with us for the service today.

David, as you know, was a dearly loved husband, a dearly loved friend, a dearly loved neighbour, a very greatly loved member of this church and of the wider community. And it's an honour to be celebrating his life here in the place where he worshipped, where he was known and loved.

Those of you who may not know I'm Reverend Beverly Watson, the vicar of All Saints. I've known David and Jo for more than a decade now, and I'm honoured to be taking this service for him today. David: you will all have many memories of him. I remember him very fondly as a clarinettist in our band, sitting over here and playing regularly in in our services. I remember him as a cabinet maker of exceptional skill, and there is evidence of his work here in the church, particularly that cross, which you'll be able to see on the wall there. That cross was made by David out of the wood from the pews that used to be here in church. It was a way of honouring the past, and looking forward to the future. So, there are many evidences of David, still here today. Personally, I remember him as a kind and gentle man with a twinkle in his eye, and I'm delighted that we can gather together to give thanks for him this morning.

BIJOU WRITES

Welcome to **Bijou Writes**, a new monthly update series where I'll share a quick behind-the-scenes snapshot of our Big Build project. Each month I'll give an overview of what's happening right now, key milestones we've reached, and what's coming next as the vision continues to unfold.

Current Progress

After a longer journey than we originally planned (we were aiming for August), we successfully achieved planning approval for the project in November 2025. This is such a significant milestone in the overall project life cycle and was achieved with Robin Nugent Architects! Whilst the timeline has stretched a little, this is a huge achievement because it means the overall design vision is formally approved as we work towards getting it built. The planning design went through many iterations but has manifested to incorporate all the ideas from the Big Build Team, the community audit and church research into the approved proposal.

What's Next? Moving into Stage 4

We are now stepping into RIBA Stage 4 (Technical Design). In simple terms, this stage is where the design gets real and detailed. The focus is on developing all the technical information needed for construction - drawings, specifications, and coordination - so the building can be constructed exactly as intended. Following the successful completion of the Planning (Stage 3) phase, Robin Nugent Architecture has concluded their involvement with the project, and the Church has appointed Symbiosis Architects to lead the design team through the next stages to completion. Symbiosis Architects is composed of duo Jaimie and Leo - both my former colleagues that I am excited to be working with through to the project completion.

Building the Dream Team

Right now, we're working to appoint our full design team, who will bring their expertise into the technical package and help develop the detailed "as-built" information. This will be inclusive of roles such as the structural engineer, quantity surveyor, ecologist, and more.

Having the right team in place is absolutely key to a successful project. While the architect continues to act as the overall design coordinator,

great buildings are always a collaboration. Each specialist brings essential knowledge - for example, a **structural engineer** will play a vital role in developing solutions to address the site's subsidence challenges and ensure the building is safe, durable, and future-proof.

We're currently reaching out to a range of companies and consultants across the different disciplines, to invite them to propose their service for the respective roles for the church to then select who will finally appoint. Our final goal is to have the full team appointed by the start of March. From there, we'll move forward with producing the detailed construction drawing package.

Final Thoughts

This month is all about preparation, collaborating, and laying the technical foundations so the vision can be delivered as smoothly as possible. Thank you for your continued support and prayers towards the project as we take this exciting next step - the momentum is building!

FANTASTICALLY FAITHFUL TRAILBLAZERS WHO GAVE THEIR ALL FOR GOD


I've always liked history, though at school it seemed a bit too big. History then meant big subjects: Waterloo, The Reformation, The Peasants' Revolt (all I can remember is it was led by Wat Tyler, which I thought was a magazine for people fitting bathrooms).

So it's only as an adult that I've rediscovered a love for the subject by looking at individual lives, and the contributions they made to the modern world. Christian publisher SPCK asked if I'd delve into some famous and not-so-famous faith-filled lives of the past few hundred years, and the *Fantastically Faithful* series of children's books was born – a great chance to delve into some unfamiliar but inspiring lives.

Some of the better-known names we've looked at in the books have included Martin Luther King and Mother Teresa, teaching me plenty I didn't know – from his banned childhood ballgame with a neighbouring (white) boy, to her refusal to have a reception for her Nobel prize win, using the money for the poor instead. But it was a bigger treat for me to look into faithful folks I knew little about.

For example, in the latest (third) book, *Fantastically Faithful Trailblazers Who Gave Their All For God*, Harriet Beecher Stowe is a name I dimly knew. Didn't she write a book? Oh that's right, she wrote the bestselling novel of the nineteenth century! Only the Bible sold more copies than her *Uncle Tom's Cabin*.

Living for a while near the Ohio River, where north met south, she helped people escape slavery, inspiring her to write: "I feel now that



the time is come when even a woman or a child who can speak a word for freedom and humanity is bound to speak. I hope every woman who can write will not be silent.”

So when Beecher Stowe wrote, she wrote from the heart, ultimately out-selling Dickens, Carroll, Poe, Hardy, Conan Doyle, Brontë, other Brontë, other Brontë... everything that century except the Bible. She once credited God as co-writer – she just showed up at the writing desk. Her tale of slavery’s brutality, that built empathy across divides of class and ethnicity.

Or how about George Cadbury – another *Fantastically Faithful Trailblazer*, and a delicious tale (well, you have to eat a few chocolates while writing about Cadbury – it’s the rules. If I listened to my stomach, I’d now be writing biographies of Mark Pringle, Henry Walker or Joe Wotsit).

In the 1870s, the Cadbury brothers expanded the family business, not in the inner city (which was choc full, like my diet), but into a greener space on the outskirts.

Their plan was to “alleviate the evils of modern, more cramped living conditions”. Each worker’s house had a garden – even a fruit tree, based on a verse from prophet Micah: “Everyone will sit under their own vine and under their own fig tree, and no one will make them afraid, for the Lord Almighty has spoken.”

Or how about the book’s most recent entrant, Kenyan businessman Charles Mulli. Abandoned as a child, Charles grew up on the streets, walking dozens of miles to seek work. He found his way into a church and a family home, then started a small transportation business, which grew and made him a multi-millionaire. But an encounter with some street children reminded him of his roots, so after prayerful consideration, he gave away most of his fortune, and even his family home, to help those who were like the child he used to be.

Others in the book include under-heralded palaeontologist Mary Anning, tennis champ Arthur Ashe, National Park innovator John Muir, and my daughter’s favourite, the loop-the-loop aviator Bessie Coleman. All fantastic, all faithful. I hope today’s youngsters find their tales as enjoyable to read as I found them to research.

I can't say I'll live as inspirational a life as any of these stars, but if I can pass on some nuggets from how they lived, I'll be glad of that. I'm told the books are aimed at 7-11 year olds, but really I think my book was aimed at me... so you can add at least 40 years to that.

REVISION OF ELECTORAL ROLL 2026

In accordance with the Church Representation Rules, the Church Electoral Roll has to be revised annually, prior to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) in March.

The 14 day notice of the revision was posted in the church lobby on Sunday 8th February. The revision period began on Sunday 22nd February and will end on Saturday 7th March. On Sunday 8th March the revised Roll will be posted and no changes can then be made until the conclusion of the APCM on Sunday 22nd March.

Whilst the main purpose of the revision is to remove any names of people no longer eligible, it is a good opportunity for new people to enrol. Enrolment can be done in a number of ways. On our website (allsaintschurchgfd.org.uk/about-us/electoral-roll), an easy to use on line form can be completed. Alternatively, there is a version which can be downloaded and, after completion, either scanned and emailed to allsaintschurchgfd@gmail.com or posted to: Electoral Roll Officer, All Saints' Church, Vicarage Gate, Onslow Village, Guildford, GU2 7QJ. There will also be paper forms available in church.

By enrolling, you will become a voting member of the Church of England and be entitled to vote at the APCM on matters such as electing the Parochial Church Council and our representatives on the Deanery Synod, and also be eligible for election to church appointments.

To qualify for inclusion on the Roll, you must be baptised and aged 16 or over and a member of the Church of England. You should also either be resident in the parish or, if not resident, then have habitually attended public worship in the parish during the six months prior to enrolment. It is also possible for members of other churches to enrol under certain conditions.

PERPETUAL MOTION

A short story by David Jesson



Hi. Call me Merle - it means 'blackbird', if it matters. I realise that this is not a common name. It gets worse. I wasn't born here. My beginnings were in the south of France, a rural idyll where my family and I spent all our time out-of-doors, come rain or shine. I suppose you could describe me as an immigrant, but I didn't really ever want to come here. I've tried to fit in, I really have - no I promised I wouldn't cry. I think the hardest part is that I haven't been able to fulfil myself. Everyone has a purpose and I have been tantalisingly close to completing mine several times, but I have been denied. Instead I have been passed from hand to hand as a gift, as a prize.

My troubles, and my travels, began when I was packed in a cardboard box with five of my sisters. For days I did not see the light of day, but heard the occasional *chink* as we were jostled in our box. The lid was opened suddenly and I saw a much greyer sky than I was used to. I was added to a display, and watched as bottles and cases were bought until finally, many months later, my turn came and I was part of a mixed case, sold to clear the way for new stock.

Again the journey, much shorter this time; again the display, here a wine-rack rather than the shop-window; again seeing my friends go before me. At last, I thought my time had come - I was taken from the rack. But no. Instead of being placed on the table in the dining room, I was put on the table in the hall. This was at least something new, but what next? I journeyed again, this time peeking out of a bag perfectly fitted for me. I was handed to someone else, amidst much hugging - and then I was forgotten by the door.

Here I stayed for a few days before being passed on again, this time with less ceremony. Over the next year I was to change hands 27 times. I was donated to four different fêtes over the summer. I listened to discussions by three different book groups. I was a house-warming present eight times. I have been so jostled around I am probably completely undrinkable.

In all my travels, the closest I came to absolute despair was the time when I was with some man who I had seen once or twice before. I hadn't realised it, but he had clearly noticed me. Whilst most others simply reached for the nearest bottle and I had been unlucky, this pig carefully marked my label in an unobtrusive but unmistakable way. He talked to himself as he did it saying that he wondered if I would ever come back. Then, with cold calculation, he passed me on. I never saw him again.

What is wrong with you people? Can Merlot somehow have gone out of fashion?






