THOUGHTS FROM THE VICARAGE



Uppermost in my mind at the moment are the 'Ten Years' celebrations which took place at All Saints on the 7th September, as I completed ten years as vicar in this parish. I was hugely touched by the kindness, generosity and thoughtfulness of so many of you on that occasion. Thank you for coming to the service, for all the work that went into planning the day, your gifts, the delicious lunch, and the kind and encouraging words that were said. These past ten years have been very

special for me, and it was a great blessing to be affirmed in that ministry as it continues.

So what next? What might the next decade hold? Clearly we need to complete the Big Build project, and place our buildings on a secure footing for the years ahead; that goes without saying. But my sense is that we need a bigger vision than simply restoring and developing our buildings. The Church is about people; it's about the kingdom of God; it's about the Lord's love and power breaking through into our world. In this season of Harvest we think about 'fruitfulness' – the fruitfulness of the earth, but also, as Christians, the fruitfulness of our church life. During our 'Ten Years' celebrations our church was packed out, and full of life and faith and hope. How wonderful it would be if our church was like that every Sunday – packed out with children and adults worshipping together, caring for each other, keeping the faith of the Gospel of Jesus Christ! I'd love to see our church continuing to grow in numbers, as well as depth of faith and commitment. It would be wonderful if the coming decade was a hugely fruitful one.

On the 18th October our PCC will be meeting at Willow Grange for the morning, to look at that theme of 'fruitfulness'. We'll be joined by Jens Mankel, one of the Mission Enablers for Guildford Diocese, who will help us think through the strategies we might put in place to see that vision for growth become a reality. Please do pray for the PCC on that morning, as we seek the Lord's way forward for our church.

And may the Lord bless you richly – and also your families and those you love - in this coming month.

MISSION FOCUS: CHURCH MISSION SOCIETY (CMS)



All Saints supports a focused group of charities, both local and international, as part of the way we live out and show Jesus' love in a practical and biblical way. You can read more about our charities on the 'get involved' section of the All Saints' website. This month, we are focusing on the Church Mission Society, better known as CMS.

The Church Mission Society story began more than 200 years ago with a group of Christians whose hearts were stirred to go to the edges. The Society was founded in Aldersgate Street in the City of London on 12 April 1799 and included people like William Wilberforce, John Venn and John Newton. Together, they worked to abolish the slave trade, they fought for the rights of oppressed people at home and they launched out onto dangerous seas to share Jesus with the world.

CMS still exists to make disciples of Jesus at the edges, but crucially, to prioritise an attitude and space to recognise that we all - and it as an organisation, are also disciples. As it seeks transformation for those who might have presumed Jesus wasn't for them, it – and those who accompany it through prayer, giving and taking action – is also being continuously transformed.

Having grown from such an organic and significant movement historically, it's hard to fit CMS into a small box or quickly summarise the organisation, or breadth of work that it does. CMS is made up of Christians from various countries, cultural backgrounds and walks of life... a vibrant mix of people in mission from the UK, Africa, Latin America, Europe, the Middle East and Asia – all following Jesus "to the edges together".

Through this heart of working "at the edges" CMS today defines its work as encouraging individuals and groups of people to follow Jesus "at the edges of existing church, at the edges of society, at the edges of our comfort zones" and as being "specifically called to mission at the margins and cultural fringes, where Jesus is not often followed and which are often overlooked or written off" both in the UK and overseas, where CMS recognises that "God is already at work in these spaces and our task is to join in".

Some examples of CMS mission at the edges might include catalysing faith-based peace movements in conflict-prone areas of Africa; supporting new Jesus followers in Muslim-majority contexts in the Middle East and North Africa; and creatively sharing the way of Jesus among spiritual but not religious seekers in the UK.

It sees change as happening person by person, community by community, and as such, examples of the work that it does are relational, and specific to each local context. It starts with connecting people with a heart for the edges so they can work together. Often this takes the form of cross-cultural hubs, pairing people from Western and non-Western backgrounds to bring change in a specific context, training people for mission in the UK and overseas, or equipping churches to look around, see what God is doing among people at the edges within their communities and join in.

CMS recognises that there isn't a 'one size fits all' mission process or programme, but has identified some key approaches from what it has learned in their 220 year history! These steps can be helpful for us, as a church, and in our own lives and communities individually, to recognise where God may be already working, or wanting to use us in our contexts, as well as providing an encouraging insight into CMS's sensitivity and expertise:

- We pray, trusting that wherever we go, God is already there and already at work. This is humbling, freeing and incredibly encouraging – to understand it's not all down to us.
- Once in a context, we pay attention and try to discover how God is already at work. We take the setting seriously: listening and learning from the local culture, discerning the best way to share Jesus. This will likely involve a mix of words and action.
- We don't work alone. We are guided by those more familiar with the way things are in a given place or space, as we work together to make disciples. We take the time to build genuine, respectful relationships.

- We are always willing to try new, creative mission methods. We learn from what works and what doesn't, and we share that learning as widely as possible.
- We don't get too comfortable we keep pushing to the edges, hoping that more and more Jesus-followers will get inspired and come, too.

TEN YEARS CELEBRATIONS - MY REFLECTIONS

Beverly's speech from the day of celebration on Sunday 7th September, with a few photos from the day.

It feels a great honour today to be standing here, among family and friends; and to have completed ten years as Vicar of All Saints. I'm hugely grateful to Trish, Jo, Robin, Henrietta and all those who've planned the events of today; and to everyone who's set aside time to be here. It feels like a very special occasion.



As I was thinking about what I might say today, I had an idea that I'd look back through my copies of the parish magazine, which comes out each month. I've kept every one of them, and interestingly, over the last ten years, only one is missing – April 2020, when Covid first struck. I thought I'd have a quick look through 120 or so magazines, and I was immediately drawn back into all that has happened over the past decade; a 'quick look' turned into some three hours or more of reading...

The first thing I really noticed is that so much happens here! My first Sunday started with a church family picnic on the field, and - ten years on – we're still holding church family picnics on the first Sunday in Sep-



tember. There are so many events which mostly still keep going, with new ones being added in: Bonfire and Fireworks nights, Harvest suppers and quiz nights, summer fairs and now autumn fairs, pancake nights, board games afternoons, pantomimes, murder mysteries at Willow Grange, Missions walks, Christian Aid car washes and cake sales. Every month there is loads going on.

And many of our events focus around the Church's year, and the round of festivals and special services: Harvest, Remembrance, Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, Pentecost. We've developed a pattern for celebrating that is unique to us: our Patronal Festival at the beginning of November with Choral Evensong led by our choir, Remembrance with all the uniformed organisations joining us, the Children's Church nativity on the Sunday before Christmas, Nine Lessons and Carols in December, the Lent lunch and our annual Lent course, the Easter Sunrise Service followed by breakfast at the Vicarage. They're all part of our 'liturgical year' – a



way of life here that I've grown to treasure, as I know many of us have.

And there are many other things that carry on behind the scenes, year by year: Children's Church, Youth Club and our Baby & Toddler group, serving children and families in our parish; our ten Small Groups which offer hospitality, prayer and the opportunity to go deeper in faith; the work of the PCC, the Finance Team, the Pastoral Team, the Missions Team, the Premises Team, our Church Wardens, our preachers, our musicians, our coffee team – so many people serving faithfully so that our church can be the special community that it is today; the ongoing offering of baptisms, weddings, confirmations and funerals; our work with local schools and Dray Court. As I read through the magazines, I was aware of the faithful service of so many people in our church. In fact almost everyone has a role to play, from our children acting as servers on Sunday mornings, through to our most senior members who continue to pray and support us financially. It's impressive; something we should never take for granted.

And as I read through the magazines I was aware too that All Saints has a history; and we're part of that ongoing journey and story today. The first Communion service took place in Onslow Village in 1923; very soon after that the 'Tin Hut' was built on this spot; and in 1967 the building we now enjoy was completed. For over a hundred years people have worshipped together in this place, loved one another, and served the wider community of this parish – and beyond. I love that sense of history. We're called to

play our part for now, while others have gone before us – and, of course, it's great to have some of those precious people with us today. And others will come after us – we'll pass on the baton to them. It feels a great privilege for me, today, to have seen that last decade in the history of All Saints. And there have been some memorable times.

One that came quite early in my time here was the '50 Years Celebrations', in 2017. We invited back baptism families, wedding couples, previous clergy, people who'd moved away, and it was a wonderful time of reflecting on the history so far. I remember Tom New, who was the vicar when this church was built, came to join us, and we had a wonderful hog roast on the field.

Another special event was the call to licensed ministry of both Alison Moulden and Cally Burch. In 2017 and 2018 Alison and Cally began their training: Alison to Licensed Lay Ministry and Cally to ordained Ministry, and it has been great to watch their progress over the years. That call to

licensed or ordained ministry has been a feature of All Saints over the past ten years: Pippa Ford joined us in 2017 as a curate, and was priested at Guildford Cathedral in 2018. Lydia Watson (now Padfield) began her ordination training a couple of years later, and will be starting a curacy in Newcastle next year. And now Andy Wells is beginning his third year of training, and will be ordained next June, becoming our curate at that point. That sense of vocation has been very special here – following in the footsteps of Mike Truman and Dave Barclay who served for many years as LLMs. I'm starting to look out and around and won-



der who might be next - do let me know if it's you!

There have been challenges over the past ten years as well – of course there have. Covid comes to mind, and had a big impact on us as well as for so many people. I found it shocking to have to close the doors of our church – something that's never happened before in the life of the church in this country. I was aware that many of our congregation were suffering, and struggling with the challenges of health, loneliness and all the rest.

But we were quick off the mark in terms of responding, and we really have to thank Trish here, with her extraordinary IT skills, and willingness to respond quickly, calmly and effectively. We held our first online service on Mother's Day 2020 – just days after the first lock-down, and with more than 200 people watching. It was the first of almost a year of services which we recorded and put out each Sunday morning. Although there were many challenges I have some fond memories of that time too: the way so many members of the congregation were willing to record themselves leading prayers, putting together music ensembles at home to lead our worship, preaching sermons into their phones, producing Children's Slots complete with activities for the children to take part in. It was amazing what we managed to achieve, and I sometimes look back through the archives and remember some of the special moments of that season – and also the way they shaped the worship pattern we have now, and our ways of doing things.

Another big challenge which came our way a few years ago was the

cracking in the walls of the library area and chapel. We've screened it off today so that you can't see how bad it is, but the problem hasn't gone away, and two years ago we realised we would need to respond. So in 2023 the Big Build Team came into being, and we've charted a way forward for our buildings. This library and chapel area is going to have to come down, because the



land is too unstable to rebuild on. We'll be redeveloping and extending the foyer area to include a large kitchen, three loos, a bigger office, a hospitality area which will double up as an overflow space for larger services (we could have done with that today), and a whole new brighter and better look. It's been a long journey, but we're getting there. We've raised the best part of £300k ourselves; we've been granted a faculty by the Church of England; and we hope to receive planning permission in the next few days or weeks. Please do continue to pray for the project, and also our vision to increasingly become more of a hub for our local community.

What else...? It's hard to know how to condense ten years into ten minutes or so. I guess really I feel All Saints, to me, is about the people; people who worship here Sunday by Sunday, people who serve one another and also the community around us, people who walk the Christian life together, and keep the faith. That's what gives me joy, Sunday by Sunday and week by week. Over the past ten years we've said goodbye to many of our faithful brothers and sisters, as they've moved to their eternal home in heaven; and some who've moved to other places. Over the vears we've also welcomed new people, steadily and consistently; and the 'parish profiles' in the magazine are a wonderful record of new people coming, joining us, and quickly becoming part of the furniture. Often we've welcomed families, many of whom came for the first time wanting baptism for their children. The Smalleys were the first and it's been a joy to watch the children grow, and Finn to start school this week. Sometimes we've welcomed people who have recently moved into the area, and are looking for either a church or a place to belong. Sometimes we've invited friends or family members, and they've found a welcome here. The Church is, of course, the people of God; that's who we are and who we always will be.

So today I'd like to thank you for coming, and thank you for continuing to encourage me as your vicar here at All Saints. It's been a rich time in my personal life too. Andrew has completed ten years as Bishop of Guildford,

and become a member of the House of Lords during that time too. We've seen three of our children married – Lydia and Sam here at All Saints; and we've become grandparents for the first time, and now have three little boys who give us much joy. We're older and wrinklier than we were – but I hope to keep going at All Saints for a little while longer; to



see the Big Build project through; to continue to see our church grow in numbers and depth of faith and love for the Lord and each other; and to continue to enjoy the blessing of this congregation which means so much to me.

So 'thank you for having me', as it were, and may the Lord continue to bless us as the years go by.

BIG BUILD UPDATE



We have suffered two setbacks in September. Unfortunately Carter Davey Architects LLP felt that they could not take over from the now closed Robin Nugent Architects practice. Although they had worked on our project for the last two years they are still tidying up affairs connected with Robin Nugent. With their practice based in Brighton, they felt unable to carry out frequent site visits once

demolition and construction has started. We are now actively seeking another practice to take on the next stage of the design work. This will include the development of the construction drawings and liaison and input from a range of specialist engineers.

Also after several attempts to contact Guildford Borough Council, they contacted us to seek another extension until the end of September. Again they stated that they were waiting for a response from Surrey Wildlife Trust. We had to agree to this request and hope to get their approval sooner than their extended date.

With the above delays, the planned information meeting for everyone who contributed to the Community Audit, our neighbours and importantly our parishioners has been postponed.

The valuation report from the approved diocesan surveyor, Gascoigne Pees was received and kickstarted the process of selling 6 Thorn Bank. Chantries & Pewleys, the estate agents, have accompanied many interested purchasers and are hopeful of soon receiving a firm offer.










A Good Old Age – An A to Z of Loving and Following the Lord Jesus in Later Years By Derek Prime, 10Publishing, £7.99

Old age often gets a bad press. Associated with grumpiness, aches and pains, loneliness, and isolation it's not something we particularly look forward to or relish when we're there. Pastor and Bible teacher, Derek Prime, writing in his 80s, shows us that there is another way to view old age. He guides us through 26 Christian priorities that we should hold to in later life. 





Threads Through The Cross 25th September - 3rd November

Jacqui Parkinson's exhibition starts with the birth of Jesus, takes the viewer through various scenes in his life, then the cross and resurrection, to Pentecost. It creates a dramatic link between 'Threads through Creation' and 'Threads through Revelation'.

'Threads through the Cross' makes the third part of an extraordinary display of three huge sequences, 'Threads through Creation', 'Threads through the Cross' and 'Threads through Revelation' as one exhibition.

This is probably not only the largest textile project by a single artist ever, but also the largest textile project for 600 years. It is astonishing in its scale and variety. It will have taken ten years, and used more than 25 million stitches. There are 44 panels. If they were presented side by side, they would stretch more than 80 metres.



The premiere was at Liverpool Cathedral in January, and the exhibition is now touring a further ten venues, taking us to the end of 2027.
