MISSION FOCUS: FRIENDS INTERNATIONAL GUILDFORD

All Saints supports a focused group of charities, both local and international, as part of the way we live out and show Jesus' love in a practical and biblical way. You can read more about our charities on the 'get involved' section of the All Saints' website. This month, we hear from Katherine Hopwood on Friends International.

Celebrating 40 years of Friendship and Faith

All Saints supports the work of Friends International Guildford (FIG) which welcomes thousands of students from other countries who are studying at the University of Surrey. Friends International has groups in more than 40 university towns and cities across the UK, and is celebrating its $40^{\rm th}$ anniversary.



Moving country to study can be daunting, and leave students feeling very alone. FIG helps students to settle here by offering a listening ear and friendship. This includes offering students the opportunity to have a meal with a host family –

often the only time a student gets to visit a family home in their time here. Hosts only have the obligation to have the students once, however often friendships form and students return for more meals and companionship. One guest that Bruce and I invited for a meal told us that it was the first time he had felt "at home" since moving to the UK. (We invited him back of course!) International students especially appreciate being invited into homes over Easter and Christmas for a meal, when the campus can feel very empty.

FIG also organises walks and day trips for students who can sign up for these online, as well as regular meetings such as Rendezvous (Friday evening chat and food for women), bring and share lunches at Manor Park campus, board games afternoons and Bible studies and training courses. The FIG staff, Lilli, Phil and Tanja, are chaplains at the University, and with the help of All Saints' own Andy Wells (who is a trainee university chaplain) and a team of volunteers, try to reach as many international students as possible at the Freshers' Fair as well as throughout the year.

If you are interested in the work of FIG, please check their website: friendsinternationalguildford.org.uk/. And if you would like to host a student for a meal (you don't need to have them to stay!) please contact: hosting.guildford@friendsinternational.uk. Someone from FIG will ar-

range to call on you to talk about hosting – this is very helpful. When hosting, FIG will let a host know if there are any foods a student cannot eat (if allergic or for religious or cultural reasons). FIG are there for international students from any country, of any faith or none. FIG is a Christian charity, but wants to support all international students while they are studying in Guildford.

UPDATE FROM MARIBOROUGH



I can't believe it is almost five months since we moved here! We are settling in well and getting to know our neighbours and the church community. We have been made very welcome. We have been busy welcoming too, with plenty of visitors from Guildford and beyond, sharing the delights of our beautiful and quiet corner of Wiltshire. BIG BUILD UPDATE

We received the sad news of the death of our architect, Robin Nugent, in late July. This has led to Robin Nugent Architects being wound up. However two members of his team, who have done most of the work on the Big Build, had previously formed their

own architectural practice - Carter Davey Architects LLP. We have discussed with them the possibility of taking on the next stage of the work. This will include the development of the construction drawings and liaison and input from a range of specialist engineers. They are keen to carry on and will send us the new fee structure shortly.

Also on 31st July we received an email from Guildford Borough Council. This sought an extension until 29th August for them to complete their work. We had to agree and hope to get their approval sooner than their extended date.

Following a recent inspection of the chapel and library areas, our structural engineer, Chris Smaller of Hockley and Dawson, advised that we should add two more Acrow props to support the main beam. This beam straddles the opening into the former library area. Two new green props have been installed.

We are in the process of selling 6 Thorn Bank using Chantries & Pewleys as the estate agents. Although the sale has been approved by the Bishop's Council, we are waiting for a valuation report from their approved surveyor, who will ensure that a fair sale price is agreed.

An information meeting will be held in the autumn from 6pm to 8pm. Everyone who contributed to the Community Audit will be invited, along with our neighbours and importantly our parishioners. This will involve a site tour, refreshments and a discussion session.



Each year, the Fairtrade Foundation takes a fortnight to highlight issues regarding fair food production. This year, they are asking us to 'Do it Fair' and to work towards fairer pay, fairer treatment and fairer futures.

As part of Fairtrade Fortnight, the foundation is asking the UK government to Brew it Fair. Like all of us, the people growing and picking our tea deserve to be able to plan for their futures, and to protect themselves from the impacts of climate change.

Here are some key tea facts from Kenyan Farmers (survey of over 250 farmers):

- Only one in five of the tea workers and tea farmers surveyed said they earn enough income every month to support their families with the essentials.
- Over 70% of tea workers said their biggest challenge is wages. Many, particularly women, mentioned they had not received wage increases or promotions after years of work, and struggled to meet costs for their families, including education for their children.
- Half of the younger tea workers surveyed said the impacts of climate change on tea production are their biggest challenge, and seeing the impact this will have on their ability to make money from working in tea in the future.
- 55% of tea farmers said their biggest challenge is changing weather patterns on their farms, raising costs and impacting their ability to maintain an adequate income from their farms.
- 99% of both tea workers and tea farmers surveyed said that Fairtrade
 Premium has been spent on projects that address their main challenges, including education and health care, community improvements such as schools and roads, and projects to make extra money,
 such as beekeeping and growing other crops.

And some facts from the Fairtrade Riskmap:

• The tea sector generally provides insufficient income to farmers and workers and wages often fall far below living wage estimates. Globally, tea production employs around 13 million people.

- Nearly 50% of tea is produced in China, followed by India, Kenya, Sri Lanka and Turkey. Tea is also a significant industry in countries such as Uganda, Malawi, Indonesia and Bangladesh.
- In many countries, more than half of all tea workers are women. In their labour-intensive, low-paid jobs, they often face gender-based violence and discrimination, and exclusion from decision-making and union representation.
- Tea plantation workers in India, Kenya and Sri Lanka are often migrants or the descendants of immigrants. They face discrimination in many forms, including gender-based, as well as ethnic violence.
- Tea cultivation is labour-intensive. Picking is done by hand and involves carrying heavy loads over long distances. The lack of protective gear exposes workers to health risks from agrochemicals.
- Global tea production faces growing threats from climate change as our weather patterns become increasingly erratic and unpredictable. Key challenges include warmer temperatures and droughts, reduced rainfall and the spread of tea-related pests and diseases.

What can we do?

- Sign a petition to call on the UK government to "introduce a UK law on Human Rights and Environmental Due Diligence (HREDD) that is centred on the needs of overseas farmers and workers." You can sign this petition here: action.fairtrade.org.uk/page/171071/petition/1
- Of course, try to only buy Fairtrade tea and coffee (like we do here at All Saints).
 - ♦ Clipper is the largest Fairtrade tea brand and supported the creation of the Fairtrade tea standards over 30 years ago.
 - ♦ In 2008, Co-op was the first UK retailer to sell Fairtrade ownbrand tea. The 99 Blend is still sold today.
 - ♦ Greggs has been offering customers Fairtrade tea in its stores and on-the-go since 2012.
 - Marks & Spencer has the longest commitment to working with Fairtrade on 100% of its own-brand Fairtrade tea and coffee of any UK retailer, and generates more Fairtrade Premium for tea growers than any other UK retailer.
 - ♦ In 2023, Ringtons supplied more Fairtrade tea globally than any other supplier.
 - ♦ Sainsbury's has converted all of its black tea sourcing to Fairtrade this year. This move builds on a longstanding 23-year

partnership between the retailer and Fairtrade and will contribute to building a sustainable tea sector and a resilient food system.

- ♦ All Waitrose & Partners' own-label tea is 100% Fairtrade.
- And of course, we can pray for fairness (see following page).

The people behind the tea... Ms Umawathi Tea plucker at Matheson Bosanquet, South India

Ms Umawathi has worked at her tea estate for the last 35 years as a tea leaf plucker. Starting as a temporary worker, she gained the security of a permanent position in 1990. Back then, the salary was just 34 rupees a day (less than 30p) and she brought up her family on that wage. 'Before Fairtrade came, wages were low. Us and the children had to survive on those wages. We had to manage everything within that.'

Born and raised in the tea growing hills of South India, Ms Umawathi is raising her two sons here. 'Here, the children's education is supported by Fairtrade. They pay for the tuition as well. They also provide bus services...Those elsewhere don't get all of this'.

With support from the Fairtrade Premium, her husband underwent an important eye operation. The tea estate now offers a regular eye clinic to its workers, their families and surrounding communities, providing glasses to those who need them and diagnosing any medical issues. Ms Umawathi feels passionately about improvements made to her working conditions: 'For me, Fairtrade is about environmental health. It should be a plastic-free area, and the drinking water should be clean. Bathrooms should be nearby.'



Dear Lord, who prayed "give us today our daily bread", we give thanks for those who work to produce our food and pray they may be given fair reward for their labours.

We pray for those who grow the things we love that can't be grown in the UK, including our favourite cup of tea, coffee and bananas. We pray for communities where a fair price sends children to school and supports basic health care.

We pray that you will guide the Fair Trade movement in its efforts to secure a fair deal for those whose bargaining power is weakest.

We pray for supermarkets, brands and other retailers that they will recognise that everyone involved in the produce they buy, and sell is important, and that sustainable communities and a sustainable planet depend on fairness for everyone in our food supply chains.

We pray for shoppers here in the UK facing cost-of-living challenges that they will recognise that fairness is for everyone.

When we come together socially and share a cuppa, in church, at parties or organised events, help us to remember to BREW IT FAIR.

Mike and Sara moved to Onslow Village from West London in 1993, and live in West Meads with their son Mark. Daughter Clare lives in Godalming with her husband Chris. Mike and Sara are both retired now, but Mike started his professional life as a tax inspector before becoming an accountant, tax consultant and later the editor of a tax magazine. Sara

worked for the BBC for 18 years, starting as a secretary, then a production assistant and finally a vision mixer. She worked on many different programmes, from Play School to Grange Hill (she worked on the very first series!) and from Top of the Pops to The Young Ones.

Since moving to Guildford Sara has spent most of her time volunteering for the National Autistic Society (their son is autistic). She was Chair of the Surrey branch for a total of 18 years and was awarded an MBE for her NAS work in 2012. Her other great love is singing, and she is currently enjoying being part of the All Saints' band. Mike spent many years in voluntary roles with All Saints, and was a Licensed Lay Minister (Reader) from 2000 to 2019. Since his retirement, he has been doing more studying and is currently completing a PhD on Implicit Religion.

Tell us what brought you to All Saints

We moved to Guildford because we wanted to get out of London, and having arrived in Onslow Village we hoped that we would like the local church – and we did!

What do you value most about All Saints and its community?








God's Big Picture, a Bible Overview By Vaughan Roberts, IVP/10Publishing, £6.49





This is probably not only the largest textile project by a single artist ever, but also the largest textile project for 600 years. It is astonishing in its scale and variety. It will have taken ten years, and used more than 25



million stitches. There are 44 panels. If they were presented side by side, they would stretch more than 80 metres.

The premiere was at Liverpool Cathedral in January, and the exhibition is now touring a further ten venues, taking us to the end of 2027.


